LEADER DEVELOPMENT AND EDUCATION

- CAC Leader Development and Education (CAC-LD&E) educates and develops leaders for full spectrum operations throughout seven schools and four centers across the nation. LD&E acts as lead agent for the Army's leader development program and continually advances the art and science of the profession of arms. CAC-LD&E seeks to develop leaders who are critical thinkers, agile in and adaptive to the contemporary operating environment, and grounded in Army Values and the Warrior Ethos.
- Established in 1881 as the School of Application for Infantry and Cavalry, the Command and General Staff College (CGSC) has evolved to meet the educational and operational needs of the United States Army. Since 2008, the CGSC is part of CAC Leader Development and Education, along with a number of other schools and centers whose missions are centered on leader development and education. CAC-LD&E ensures the professional vitality of the US Army's corps of officers by preparing them to discharge their duties in the service of our nation. Today's contemporary operating environment requires leaders for tomorrow's joint, interagency, and multinational operations. CAC-LD&E must replicate that operational



environment in the classroom, therefore, CGSC is more than an "Army" school. It is a joint, interagency, and multinational college with international officers, sister service and interagency students and faculty who learn to apply critical thinking to solve complex problems.

MISSION COMMAND CENTER OF EXCELLENCE (MC COE)

- The Mission Command Center of Excellence (MC CoE) was established to lead the execution of the Mission Command Warfighting Function (MC WfF) for the Army. The MC CoE provides a

balanced and comprehensive approach to developing capabilities that advance both the art and science of mission command (MC).

- To facilitate this mission, MC CoE collects and analyzes lessons learned as they are fused at the Center for Army Lessons Learned (CALL) and transfers those lessons learned to CAC-Training (CAC-T) and CAC-LD&E. MC CoE further distills these lessons into long-term doctrine through the Combined Arms Doctrine Directorate (CADD). Finally, MC CoE, through the Capability Development and Integration Directorate (CDID), develops resource-informed, integration-focused,

outcome-based solutions that enhance our current forces, supplement our future force and leverage existing joint capabilities across the Army.

COMBINED ARMS CENTER-TRAINING

- The Combined Arms Center-Training (CAC-T) and its eight organizations are key players in Army leader development and operational readiness. They support the training, education and experiences of leaders and units to conduct FSO successfully anywhere along the range of operations.
- CAC-T organizations enhance Army training and education—in the classroom, at home stations and through self-development—supporting challenging experiences for leaders and units as they develop throughout their careers. CAC-T delivers a wide range of training and education products, programs and services that includes training strategies; exercises to support deploying commanders and their staffs; requirements for live fire ranges; training aids, devices, and simulations and simulators; tools to help commanders manage unit training; continuous training and education through distributed learning; and instruction on all-service air-ground operations.
