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Matthias Rueb, born 1962 in Zavelstein (Germany), is Washington Bureau Chief of Germany's leading quality newspaper FRANKFURTER ALLGEMEINE ZEITUNG (appr. 400.000 copies daily). In 1989, after studies in philosophy, theology, political science and history in Berlin and Paris, he joined the "FAZ" as an editor in the arts and literature section. From 1994 to June 2002 he was political correspondent for Southeastern Europe and the Balkans based in Budapest, covering the wars in Croatia, Bosnia, and Kosovo as well as the transition of the "young democracies" in that region.

Since August 2002 he has been Washington Bureau Chief and political correspondent to the US, Canada, Mexico, and the Caribbean. He reported from Iraq in May 2003 and - as an embedded reporter - in May, September and December 2007 as well as in December 2008 and in February 2009 from Baghdad.

He published several books on the former Yugoslavia, e.g. "Balkan-Transit. Das Erbe Jugoslawiens" (1998), "Kosovo. Ursachen und Folgen eines Krieges in Europa" (1999), "Flucht in die Zukunft. Bosnien nach dem Krieg" (2001). His books on the US include one on the "Atlantic Rift" between the US and Europe ("Der atlantische Graben. Amerika und Europa auf getrennten Wegen", 2004) and his latest on religion and politics in the US ("Gott regiert Amerika. Religion und Politik in den USA, 2008).
