




Doctrine Update 1-16

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Compendium of Recently Published Army Doctrine

The doctrine community needs the most current information on recent publications. Each discussion provides a short synopsis of new Army doctrine reference publications (ADRP), field manuals (FMs), Army techniques publications (ATPs), and multi-Service publications. These synopses provide readers with the new doctrinal concepts.

Army Doctrine Reference Publications

Army Publishing Directorate (APD) published the following ADRPs during the first quarter of FY16: ADRP 1-02 and ADRP 1-03. A brief synopsis of each publication and a link to its location are provided below:

ADRP 1-02, *Terms and Military Symbols*, constitutes approved Army doctrinal terminology and symbology for general use. It builds on the foundational doctrine established in ADP 1-02.


The principal audience for ADRP 1-02 is all members of the profession of Arms. Commanders and staffs of Army headquarters serving as joint task force or multinational headquarters should also refer to applicable joint or multinational doctrine concerning the range of military operations and joint or multinational forces. Trainers and educators throughout the Army will also use this publication.




ADRP 1-03, *The Army Universal Task List*, provides a comprehensive listing of Army tasks, missions, and operations. The Army Universal Task List (AUTL) is intended for proponent training developers to use to develop more comprehensive training and evaluation outline (T&EO) evaluation criteria for collective tasks and proponent combat developers to better understand the tasks a given unit must perform. The AUTL divides the warfighting functions into Army tactical tasks (ARTs).

The principal audience for ADRP 1-03 is the institutional force, specifically personnel performing capability development, integration functions, and training development. Commanders and staffs in the operational force should refer to the Combined Arms Training Strategies (known as CATS) in the Army Training Management System (known as ATMS) which contain T&EOs for collective and individual tasks. Commanders and staffs of Army headquarters serving as joint task force or multinational headquarters should also refer to applicable joint or multinational doctrine concerning the range of military operations and joint or multinational forces.

Field Manuals


APD published the following field manuals during the first quarter of FY16: FM 3-01 and FM 3-96. A brief synopsis of each publication and a link to its location are provided below:

FM 3-01, *U.S. Army Air and Missile Defense Operations*, provides doctrinal tactics and procedures associated with integrating the air defense function into planning at strategic, operational, and tactical levels. FM 3-01 provides doctrinal guidance for commanders, staffs, leaders, and trainers at all levels and is the basis for air defense artillery service school curricula development.

The primary target audience for this manual includes all fires Soldiers. In addition, other Services and joint organizations can use this manual to gain insight to Army air and missile defense operations.

FM 3-96, *Brigade Combat Team*, provides doctrine for the brigade combat team (BCT). This publication describes relationships, organizational roles and functions, capabilities and limitations, and responsibilities within the BCT. Tactics are discussed in this manual and are intended to be used as a guide. They are not prescriptive. FM 3-96 applies to the infantry brigade combat team, Stryker brigade combat team, and armored brigade combat team.

The principal audience for FM 3-96 is the commanders, staffs, officers, and noncommissioned officers of the brigade, battalions, and squadron within the BCT. The audience also includes the United States Army Training and Doctrine Command institutions and components, and the United States Army Special Operations Command. This publication serves as an authoritative reference for personnel developing doctrine, materiel and force structure, institutional and unit training, and standard operating procedures for the BCT.



ATP 2-19.1, *Echelons Above Corps Intelligence Organizations*, describes the roles, responsibilities, and capabilities of intelligence organizations at echelons above corps. It outlines the following:

- Vision, mission, and enduring functions of functional intelligence commands, theater military intelligence brigades, and the intelligence elements of Army Service component commands.
- Roles, responsibilities, and organizational relationships of echelons above corps military intelligence organizations and the support they provide to the intelligence enterprise.
- Mission, structure, and organization of the United States Army Intelligence and Security Command.
- Support provided by the 300th Military Intelligence Brigade (Linguist), Military Intelligence Readiness Command, Army Cryptologic Operations Directorate, and Army Geospatial-Intelligence Office.

The principal audience for this manual is commanders, staffs, Soldiers, Army Civilians, and civilian contractors assigned to or supported by echelons above corps intelligence organizations. ATP 2-19.1 is classified Secret//No Foreign Dissemination.



- Counterintelligence (CI) mission areas and CI specific functions.
- The roles and responsibilities of Army, joint, and national CI elements and the U.S. intelligence community.
- Specific techniques and procedures for conducting CI investigations, analysis, technical services, and support activities in support of Army operations and programs.
- The considerations for CI support in specific operations, missions, and environments.

The information contained in this manual applies to Soldiers conducting signals intelligence activities and serves as a reference for military intelligence commanders and staff planners. 
ATP 2-22.82, *Biometrics-Enabled Intelligence (U)*, is concerned principally with biometrics-enabled intelligence, the fundamentals of biometrics, and biometric systems, as well as with biometric tools used in current operations. ATP 2-22.82—

- Includes the biometric processes in support of the intelligence process during the full range of military operations.
- Outlines roles and responsibilities of intelligence units and individuals using biometrics in current operations.
- Discusses intelligence considerations for the use of biometrically enabled watch lists.



Change 1 to ATP 3-05.1, *Unconventional Warfare*, clarifies core, supporting, and related activities of unconventional warfare and adjusts the hierarchical formatting to reflect these key relationships. This publication serves as the doctrinal foundation for subordinate Army special operations forces unconventional warfare (UW) doctrine, force integration, materiel acquisition, professional education, and individual and unit training. This publication also serves as the Army’s description of UW, which will be useful in the larger joint and interagency environment.







This classified manual defines environmental considerations and provides guidance on integrating them into the operations process. This manual also provides guidance on the development of command environmental programs and standard operating procedures to support operations and training. ATP 3-34.5 establishes and explains the principles of environmental support during operations and the ways in which Army and Marine Corps commanders develop and implement command environmental programs.

This publication aims to aid commanders in understanding environmental considerations. It describes how to integrate and apply environmental considerations through existing staff procedures.



ATP 3-18.11 presents a series of concise, proven techniques and guidelines that are essential to safe, successful military free-fall (MFF) operations. The techniques and guidelines prescribed are generic and represent the safest and most effective methods available for executing MFF operations. This ATP provides a consolidated reference for MFF airborne operations and training and will assist commanders at all levels in preparing special operations forces in the execution of MFF airborne operations.



It describes the missions, duties, and responsibilities of all organizations involved in moving APS to an operational area and handing it off to designated Army units. It also describes planning and executing pre-positioned operations as well as supporting the combatant commander in a theater.

The principal audience for ATP 3-35.1 is all members of the Profession of Arms. Commanders and staffs of Army headquarters serving as joint task force or multinational headquarters should also refer to applicable joint or multinational doctrine concerning the range of military operations and joint or multinational forces.



This publication also provides guidance for commanders who determine the force structure, budget, training, materiel, operations, and sustainment requirements necessary to prepare special operations aviation to accomplish their missions.




ATP 4-02.1, *Army Medical Logistics*, addresses the role of medical logistics (MEDLOG) in the Army Health System (AHS). It covers MEDLOG operations from the support battalions at the tactical level to the medical command (deployment support) (MEDCOM [DS]) and theater sustainment command. In this last command, critical crossover occurs among strategic agencies within the AHS and commands and the operational units providing logistics support in-theater.

This publication describes Army MEDLOG capabilities and their role in sustaining the AHS mission. This publication primarily focuses on MEDLOG support for units in the operating force. However, it also addresses MEDLOG capabilities in the generating force to present a clear picture of the Army resources and infrastructure required to sustain the AHS mission. The integration of operating and generating force capabilities provide strategic efficiency, which enables the seamless delivery of AHS support from the point of injury through successive roles of care to the continental United States (CONUS)-support base.




ATP 4-02.43, *Army Health System Support to Army Special Operations Forces*, provides the doctrine for the Army Health System (AHS) support of Army special operations forces (ARSOF) as part of the protection and sustainment warfighting functions support to unified land operations.

ATP 4-02.43 provides an overview of AHS support and its mission to provide health care to Soldiers across the range of military operations. It identifies and discusses the purpose of the AHS, reviews the roles of medical care, and reviews the AHS principles. It also examines ARSOF medical capabilities and the range of medical personnel and their responsibilities serving in ARSOF. In addition, it compares AHS support to conventional forces and to ARSOF.




ATP 4-41, *Army Field Feeding and Class I Operations*, provides field food service doctrine through methods, techniques, and procedures for providing subsistence to Soldiers during the full range of military operations. The publication provides an in-depth overview of the Army field feeding system, modular subsistence sustainment, personnel responsibilities, and class I supply planning considerations. It also discusses the Army family of rations and field kitchen equipment. Lastly, ATP 4-41 provides guidance and operational procedures for field kitchen operations, class I supply operations, and contingency operations.

The Army has conducted many combat and stability operations that have greatly affected the way class I is provided to Soldiers. This publication incorporates these lessons learned. Where appropriate, this publication references other food service doctrinal publications, such as AR 30-22, *The Army Food Program*, DA PAM 30-22, *Operating Procedures for the Army Food Program*, and TM 4-41.12, *Food Program Operations*.




ATP 4-44, *Water Support Operations*, provides doctrinal guidance and direction for Army and Marine Corps units conducting water support operations. In the Army, water support operations are a Quartermaster Corps function, as well as a component of Army logistics. In the Marine Corps, water support operations are a general engineering function, as well as a component of tactical-level logistics.

ATP 4-44 provides an overview of water support operations, to include water treatment, storage, distribution, and issue. In addition, it familiarizes readers with water organizations and staffs in the Army and Marine Corps. It discusses planning for water support operations. Water consumption requirements, water reconnaissance, and deployment preparation are explained in detail.




ATP 6-02.70, *Techniques for Spectrum Management Operations*, provides overarching doctrinal guidance to Army spectrum users. It describes how spectrum managers support commanders through the warfighting functions, the military decisionmaking process, and the common operational picture. This ATP provides technical descriptions of the spectrum management operations (SMO) tool's capabilities and compatibility with other tools, as well as descriptions to use these tools in the execution of SMO in unified land operations.

The most significant change is the introduction and use of the acronym SMO, introduced in FM 6-02, *Signal Support to Operations*. ATP 6-02.70 discusses links Army SMO to the warfighting functions, describes how SMO support and enable commander's efforts as they exercise mission command, describes spectrum information and products necessary at the corps and joint task force levels, and provides an overview of the many useful tools spectrum managers use in support of unified land operations.




Multi-Service Publications

Change 1 to ATP 3-01.15, *Multi-Service Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Integrated Air Defense System*, adds Appendix J, “Counter Low, Slow, Small (LSS) Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS) Operations”. It also inserts new pages for appendix J (Secret), and updates the table of contents and glossary. The entire publication provides guidance for command, control, and communications specific planning, coordination, and interoperability for a multi-Service integrated air defense system (known as IADS). The target audience is joint task force staff planners, component and functional commanders, and those unit commanders participating in and providing assets to a theater or specific area of operations.



ATP 3-55.6, *Multi-Service Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Air-to-Surface Radar System Employment*, provides tactics, techniques, and procedures for air-to-surface radar systems in the joint operations area to detect targets, support intelligence production, and coordinate attack or reconnaissance on those targets. This publication covers theater-level, air-to-surface radar systems and discusses system capabilities and limitations performing airborne command and control; wide area surveillance for near-real-time targeting and target development; and processing, exploiting, and disseminating collected target data.


